The year has gone well for REAP but we have slowed down due to the lack of operating funds and the continued erosion of economic developers in both regions. The REAP Zones have relied on their partnerships with the county and city developers to funnel loan applicants to the micro loan funds and revolving loan fund as well as to collaborate on joint and regional projects in the Zones.

In the past few years, the Southwest REAP Zone has lost developers in Slope and Golden Valley County as well a developer at the Slope Electric Cooperative. In 2016, the Strom Center for Entrepreneurship was abruptly closed. The Regional Council also reduced their staff by two positions. This is a loss of at least 10 people who had been working in some capacity for economic development in the region.

In the CONAC Zone, McHenry County abandoned their developer position in 2016. Both Bottineau County and the city of Rugby have open positions but are filling those now. It is uncertain whether Northern Plains Electric Cooperative will replace their long time developer who is retiring in April.

Loan & Grant Programs

In 2016, REAP loan programs distributed \$125,000 to 9 projects leveraging another \$317,000. Together, these loans anticipate the retention of 13 jobs and the creation of 39 jobs to the REAP Zones. Loans were made to three restaurants, a food truck, a grocery store, a coffee shop, an embroidery shop, a beauty shop and a winery and vineyard.

The total loans at the end of 2016 was 61 loans with outstanding loan funds of \$510,016. All loan funds have a combined available balance of \$639,342 to make more loans in the REAP Zones.

REAP Set-Asides under the 2016 **USDA Rural Development Rural Business Grants** saw 13 grant applications from the REAP Zones. Nine of those applications were funded for a total of \$682,417 with leveraged funds at another \$216,608. Those funded were a restaurant renovation of a historic bank in Anamoose, an expansion study and aquaponics equipment for Dakota College Bottineau, renovations for a community facility in the city of Knox, horticulture equipment and training for the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa, technical assistance and training for direct sales of local foods to wineries, equipment for a Bowman Commercial Kitchen, a feasibility study for a community owned theater in Bowman, and equipment for the fitness center in the city of Hettinger. These projects are anticipated to retain 13 jobs and create another 21 jobs.

In the SW REAP Zone, the city of New England was assisted by the designation and points available to REAP Zone projects to secure a USDA Rural Development Rural Utility loan of \$5 million for water and sewer upgrades.

Grant writing efforts secured grants of \$1,000 from the Slope Electric Grant program for the Bowman Commercial Kitchen renovations and \$10,000 from a Consensus Council Community Innovation Grant for a statewide Rural Grocer Event in January 2016. In all, REAP was involved in loans or grants for 21 entities for a total of \$5,818,417 with leveraged funds of \$537,628 for a total of \$6,357,045 in 2016.

USDA Rural Development Funded REAP Projects Completed

<u>Car Ferry Feasibility Study</u>. Under a previous USDA Rural Development grant, a feasibility study was completed for a car ferry crossing on Lake Sakakawea. The cost of the ferry and two docking station is approximately \$20 million with 80% of that available through a federal competition leaving \$4 million to be raised. It appears the ferry could manage to cover its annual costs through crossing fees. Much more is needed to be done on this project beginning with the establishment of a stakeholder group to move the project forward. <u>REAP Strategic Plans</u>. The process included a survey, the Wilder Collaboration Factors Inventory, and face-to-face meetings of the three REAP entities. Thirty persons participated in the surveys and 47 people participated in the Strategic Planning Sessions.

The combined results of the inventory showed members indicated their strengths were a history of working together and collaboration. They respect one another and represent a cross section of people who have a stake in what we are trying to accomplish. They felt there is a lot of flexibility in decision making and that people were open to different options and communicated openly with one another.

The survey indicated discussions may be needed about concrete, attainable goals and objectives; whether the group has adequate funds to do what it wants to accomplish; whether those participating have a clear sense of their roles and responsibilities; whether there is sufficient funds, staff, materials and time; and whether they had the appropriate cross section of members and organizations in the group.

<u>Cooperative Child Care</u>. This project attempted to use the cooperative childcare model which directly involves employers and parents in the establishment of a center and its' operations. Targeted cities were Rolette and Hettinger. Though we didn't establish a cooperative in either community, efforts did in some way support the establishment of a private center for 30 children in Hettinger and one for 15 children at the nursing home in Rolette. The most recent addition is a local foods page. In addition, the Department of Commerce will be sharing the site with new developers in the state through their new developer training program.
